A CAUSE FOR CELEBRATION

Henry Mitchell, a noted preacher, teacher, and historian of African American preaching, once said something in a lecture that has stayed with me ever since: "Over time, communities become what they celebrate." Linger with that thought for a moment. What are the things we celebrate as a country, or community, or family, and how do those things that most receive our attention and adoration shape who we are?

I think that's a good question to ponder with regard to our congregation as well, particularly as we lift up the 100th anniversary of Mount Olivet. Sunday, January 12, will be our Anniversary Sunday, one hundred years and one day after nineteen adults and fourteen children first gathered together to worship as the community that would soon become Mount Olivet Lutheran Church. But what, exactly, are we celebrating?

Is it the indomitable spirit of those who first gathered? Is it the many buildings – and capital campaigns that made those buildings possible – that have been home to this congregation? Is it the impact this congregation has had – and continues to have – through its many affiliated ministries? Is it the visionary pastoral and lay leadership that has guided the congregation for a century? Is it the multitudes of people who have called this church home and given generously of their time, talents, and money to make it what it is? Is it the lives changed through participation in the worship, learning, fellowship, and service opportunities to which this congregation is committed?

I would answer "yes!" to all of these possibilities and more. But I would also suggest one more, and even go so far as to say this is the central element of our celebration and thanksgiving: God's presence in, promises to, and work through Mount Olivet Lutheran Church. God is present in this church and has been from the beginning. If that were not true, we would not have flourished and grown. Before, above, and beyond all else, Mount Olivet is a place where people encounter – and are encountered by - the God of love and grace we know through Jesus Christ. Similarly, we gather each week grateful for, and trusting in, the promises that God makes to us in Christ: that we are accepted and loved as we are and that God will hold us close and bring us through all things, even death into new life. Finally, we give thanks for and celebrate God's intention to use all of who we are and what we have to serve God's children and world. The Church never exists for itself, but rather reflects God's love for the world by making that love tangible through care, compassion, and service.

We have much to celebrate at Mount Olivet. And I think it's vital that we keep God's presence and promises at the center of our celebrations because this is what enables and empowers everything else and shapes who we are as a people. I suspect that the folks who first gathered at the Iverson farmhouse on that cold Sunday in January of 1920 to form Mount Olivet Church could never have imagined what we are today: a church of more than 15,000 Christians worshipping at two campuses; the owner and operator of a conference and retreat center to the south and beloved camp to the north; a sponsor of ministries that care for the elderly, for the young, for those with disabilities, for those struggling with mental illness, and for those who are dying; a gathering space for budding musicians and seasoned teachers; the host to lutefisk suppers and holiday boutiques, car aficionados, circles, and quilters; a partner with social service groups throughout the Twin Cities; and so much more.

At the same time, they also could not have imagined that by the close of the decade the nation would be plunged into an economic depression the likes of which had never been seen. Nor could they have imagined that "the war to end all wars" that had just recently ended would prove to be only the prelude to a second, and more devastating, world war. They could not have imagined any number of other challenges that would come their way, and yet they persevered and eventually flourished. Why? Because God was in the midst, making and keeping promises and using them to serve their community.

Just so, we cannot predict what opportunities and challenges will come our way. But we move into the future confident that God is still with us, that God is still making and keeping promises, and that God is still at work in and through us for the sake of the world God loves so much. And that, my beloved

people of Mount Olivet, is cause for celebration!



Epiphany - Come and See!

One of the repeated invitations Jesus makes to all kinds of people across the pages of St. John's Gospel is "Come and See." It is an invitation and promise all rolled into one, as those who come and see are then introduced to a level of acceptance and grace that is as life-giving as it is surprising. Across January we will be immersed into some of these early and significant stories.

Before jumping into John, however, we take a brief and meaningful detour into St. Matthew's Gospel on **January the 5th**, as he relates the story of the magi — first-century Persian astrologers and philosophers who are the first to "come and see," as they are guided by a star to discover and worship the newborn king in Bethlehem. This is the second year that we will celebrate the **Festival of Epiphany** on the day our choirs and Sunday school classes return and activities at church resume their normal flow after the holidays. Our celebration will again feature the Three Kings of Matthew's story at both campuses, and after their appearance in worship they'll also visit our Sunday School children.

A question to ponder: what guides you as you navigate this life, and how might Mount Olivet help you follow the light that guides us to God's grace?

On January 12th, we celebrate **Anniversary Sunday**, one hundred years and one day after fourteen children and nineteen adults first gathered at the Iverson homestead to worship together in what would become Mount Olivet Lutheran Church. Our story that day from St. John's Gospel is all about John the Baptist. Except in John's Gospel, he never baptizes Jesus! Instead, he serves as a witness to Jesus' anointing by the Holy Spirit and his identity as the Son of God.

One question this story prompts: in what ways do we witness to the grace we've experienced in Christ, and what might we do to share our faith and love of church with others?

Jesus calls his first disciples in the story we hear from John on **January 19th**. Some are eager and interested and follow quickly. Others are slower to respond. And still others are downright skeptical that this guy from Nazareth can possibility be the promised Messiah. Which is kind of neat, as today there are still all kinds of responses to Jesus — quick, slow, doubtful, skeptical, and more. And yet Jesus calls us all and waits with patience and grace for our response.

What, we might ask, holds us back from answering Jesus' call, and what difference does it make to know Jesus will wait, continuing always to invite us into a deeper experience of grace?

On January 26, we hear of Jesus' first "miracle" — John likes to call them "signs." Interestingly, it is not casting out demons or feeding thousands, but rather something that initially feels more mundane: turning water into wine at a wedding. But wine, in the ancient world, was a sign of blessing, and so the story highlights that as long as Jesus is on the scene, God's blessings are abundant and without end.

As we hear this story, we might wonder where we've experienced God's abundance and blessing in our lives, and how we might help others to see God at work blessing them.

DEVOTIONS

I think we sometimes forget about Epiphany. Maybe it's because we have such a huge cultural emphasis on Christmas that everything around it gets diminished. Maybe it's because Christmas seems to start earlier and

earlier every year, so by the time we get through New Year's we just don't have much left in the tank. Or perhaps it's because the moral of the Epiphany story is not as clear as Christmas. At Christmas we celebrate the incarnation, the birth of God in human form. God in Christ Jesus has come to live among us as one of us in order to perfectly love us. At Epiphany we celebrate...what?

Epiphany is, quite simply, the first chapter of the new story. On this festival day, we celebrate the irresistible spread of the Christmas story. Before email, before Twitter, the Three Wise Men of Matthew 2 (or the Three Kings, or the Magi) knew of Christ's birth because this good news was written across the heavens. We celebrate that God revealed Jesus to the nations from the very first. And we celebrate that this, along with Christmas, reveals more about who God is. Our God is one who chooses to take on our form, take on the burdens and pains and limits of our reality. And our God is one who transforms that reality by setting us free from those burdens and pains and limitations. Epiphany reminds us that this God is also one who insists on sharing this new reality with every nation. – PASTOR DIXON



Mount Olivet's Early Beginnings



As we continue to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Mount Olivet we are discovering a rich history of music, service, education, growth, inspiration and loyalty. God's work in and through our congregation is even more apparent when we consider the humble beginnings launched by the faith and fellowship of four families.

A century ago those families – 20 adults and 23 children – signed the charter to become Mount Olivet Lutheran Church. In the early days, monthly meetings were held in the homes of members, and the minutes were written in beautiful longhand. Worship moved to the vacant Iverson farmhouse, and in September of 1920 the founders decided to start advertising church services in the local newspapers. By Christmas 1921, Mount Olivet had grown enough to have its first choir, accompanied on the organ by Hazel Andresen, who was just fourteen years old.

The first new sanctuary was constructed at 53rd and Lyndale in 1923 at a cost of \$3,000 – \$45,000 in today's dollars. That year also marked the formation of Mount Olivet's Luther League, a youth ministry with chapters in Lutheran churches across the nation. In 1924 three young people became the first confirmation class led by Reverend G. P. Williams, the first pastor called to Mount Olivet.

From these early beginnings to today's vibrant congregation and programs, we have much to celebrate over the life and growth of our church, thanks to God's presence in the people and ministries of Mount Olivet. We encourage you to reflect and give thanks to God for what Mount Olivet means to you!

"I remember how the church grew, a few members at a time. We didn't take in more than one or two families at a time and, my, but they were welcome!

"On Christmas and Easter, of course, the church was filled, and the janitor would go down into the basement and put up supports so the floor wouldn't give way.

"Mount Olivet history is still in the making. If you pause to look at the magnificent church building with its cross lifted to the sky, it seems impossible that it all started in an old frame building with 43 members."

Who Is Serley?



DID YOU KNOW?

The Minneapolis campus has two chapels flanking the main sanctuary. One is named for Pastor Reuben K. Youngdahl and the other for Olaf Serley (both pictured above). Mr. Serley was a business man and charter member of Mount Olivet, and the leader of the group who took the initiative to get a new Lutheran church for south Minneapolis.

His son, also named Olaf, was only six years old when the church was organized, and he was the last living charter member who was still active at Mount Olivet when he died in 1990. His sister Margaret chronicled her childhood memories of the harmony and warm spirit of the church's first decade (see left).

The chapel named for the senior Serley honors all those pioneers who faithfully gave heart, mind, soul, and sweat that we might have the blessings of Mount Olivet today.

Norwegian? Swedish?

In Minnesota, the land of strong opinions about lefse and lutefisk, there is a friendly rivalry between Norwegians and Swedes that is still alive and well today (as any St. Olaf or Gustavus grad will admit). These cultural affiliations were even more pronounced at the time of Mount Olivet's formation in 1920, given the heavy immigration pattern from both countries to the Midwest, not to mention the relatively recent establishment of Norway's independence from Sweden in 1905. From language to food to social circles to church, one's country of origin played a defining role.

So it might be surprising that Mount Olivet, a proudly Swedish Lutheran church, was almost a member of the Norwegian synod. Of the first four families that came together to worship in the Richfield district of Minneapolis, two hailed from Norway. They led the infant congregation to first approach the Norwegian Lutheran Church for help establishing a new congregation in the area, a request that was turned down. Augustana Lutheran Synod, a Swedish American entity, recognized the need for another church in this area of the Twin Cities and offered its guidance and leadership to developing Mount Olivet.

English? Evangelical?

Adding more ambiguity to the cultural heritage of our congregation, the original name was Mount Olivet English Lutheran Church, a nod to the language used for worship services. In light of WWI, U.S. immigrants experienced increasing pressure to demonstrate loyalty to their new country. Native tongues were spoken in some homes, and some early church records were written in Swedish, but cultural heritage was secondary to keeping their Lutheran faith alive in the new country.

Today an observant eye might notice a stone on our Minneapolis church building that reads "Mount Olivet Evangelical Church." Martin Luther's early followers were called "Evangelicals," a term derived from the Greek word for "gospel," due to Luther's emphasis on Jesus' good news that we are loved and saved not by our good works but by God's gift of faith.

As Shakespeare put it, a rose by any other name would smell as sweet. What matters more than our cultural roots or descriptive adjectives is our recognition of God's glory and grace, our love for Jesus and our neighbors, and our openness to the Holy Spirit working in us and through us. Mount Olivet is more than a name, a building, a centennial milestone. It is a community of believers dedicated to loving and serving God together. Thanks be to God!

Booming Metropolis, Blossoming Church

Minneapolis, situated along the Mississippi River near fertile farmland, grew quickly thanks to the flour milling industry that reached its peak around 1916. Though the Great Depression slowed development in the 1930s, growth resumed after World War II as soldiers returned home and started families. The city's population, measured at 200,000 in 1900, climbed to 520,000 residents by 1950.

Streetcars fueled residential development in the emerging inner-ring suburbs as businesses and families moved away from the urban core. Nearby Richfield was the fastest growing of all the Minneapolis suburbs, with its population bursting 363% between 1940 and 1950. Like the rest of mid-century Midwestern America, southwest Minneapolis neighborhoods and nearby suburbs saw a dramatic increase in the number and size of its schools, churches, synagogues and shopping

centers. Organizations and religious congregations served an important role in bringing people together and welcoming them to their new neighborhoods.

Mount Olivet, near the Minneapolis border with Richfield, was nicely situated to serve as a church home for the flourishing neighborhood. With a senior pastor who had a passion for door-knocking and relationship building, many people found themselves warmly welcomed into the congregation within days of moving into the area. It was more than an invitation to worship, however. It was powerful encouragement to become active in the church's ministries. So the people came, they got involved, and they stayed in this vibrant, impactful community. They heard about God's love and grace Sunday mornings, and they lived out that Christian welcome and service, building a faith congregation that now numbers more than 15,000 baptized people.



MOUNT OLIVET CELEBRATES THROUGH MUSIC AND ART



Some years ago, historian Thomas Cahill wrote a cleverly titled and thought-provoking book, *How the Irish Saved Civilization*. His major point was that in the darkest years of the middle ages, it was the church – and especially the monasteries of Ireland – that continued to create, preserve, and save great works of art. From paintings to illuminated manuscripts, the Irish church founded by St. Patrick became a repository of the best of Western culture when so much of Europe was being overrun by barbarians. And when Europe emerged from the "dark ages," it was the light of the Irish church that led the way.


Sometimes I think today's Church is called to a similar task. The Church has for centuries, of course, commissioned great art. From Michelangelo's frescoes to Handel's "Messiah," the Church has for centuries cultivated and sponsored art that both shares the faith and promotes beauty. But in recent years, as the church at large has struggled and the culture has moved away from classical art, the role of the church to promote both the faith and artistry has never

been more important. Lutherans have historically been at the forefront of that movement. Consider for just a moment, the proud choral traditions – and Christmas concerts! – of our Lutheran colleges. We believe God is delighted by beautiful things and that art continues to both ennoble the soul and provide an opportunity to learn about and experience God's grace.

In that tradition, as part of our Centennial celebration Mount Olivet and devoted members of our church have commissioned five choral works and several pieces of artwork to give voice to our love of our church and our faith, make it easier to share that love with others, and be enriched by the beauty of these pieces.

First, the musical compositions, selected to highlight Mount Olivet's love of congregational singing and our remarkable choirs for all age levels.

- 1. World-renowned composer and conductor of The Concordia Choir, René Clausen, has composed a special arrangement of the beloved hymn "Great is Thy Faithfulness" for choir and congregation. René is a longtime friend of Mount Olivet, having brought the Concordia College Choir here on many occasions, and we hope he will be able to conduct this piece at our culminating Centennial Worship service at Orchestra Hall next November.
- 2. Emmy Award-winning composer, Steve Heitzeg, is creating an acapella anthem based on a Dag Hammarskjold text for the Senior Choir. Steve, a graduate of Gustavus College, came to Mount Olivet last spring to see and hear the choir before starting his work and we are excited to see how he combines two prayers by Dag Hammarskjold, the Swedish diplomat, Secretary General of the United Nations, and life-long Lutheran.
 - 3. John Leavitt, a prolific composer who has also been at Mount Olivet many times as a guest conductor, composer, and organist, is working on an anthem for our Cathedral Choir. The composition will be based on a Scripture passage that we hope our young people will commit to memory and take with them throughout their lives.
 - 4. Mark Patterson, a well-known choral composer, is setting selected scripture passages into an anthem with piano accompaniment for our Chapel Choir (4th–6th grades) which we know will inspire them and us.
 - 5. As shared in the December Messenger and debuted at our Christmas Concert, we were delighted with the winning entry of our first-ever Christmas Carol competition and thrilled that the winning composer was John Widen, lifelong member of Mount Olivet and current member of the Senior Choir.





Second, two recognized artists have been engaged thus far to help us see and appreciate our beloved church.

"Mount Olivet Evening" is by renowned water-

color painted John Salminen. Known particularly for his urban landscapes, Salminen has received more than 200 awards for his artwork and has been featured in more than thirty





single-artist exhibitions. His painting evokes a sense of the warmth of Mount Olivet fellowship and hangs in the main hallway of the Minneapolis Campus across from the Church Lounge.

Mark Herman, the graphic designer behind the well-known "Minnesota Landmark Series" – featuring iconic sites such as the Boundary Waters, Lake Harriet, Fort Snelling, and more – has created a "Mount Olivet Series" of graphic designs that are available in prints. So far, we have seen his day and night renderings of the Minneapolis Campus, a landscape of the new West Campus, and his "Christmas at Mount Olivet." More prints, featuring Cathedral of the Pines, are coming!

We are delighted by the opportunity to lift up the ministry and legacy of Mount Olivet, promote the arts in our community, and continue the tradition of combining faith and art in meaningful ways. A Past, Present, and Future Look at the Youth Office



Cindy Johnson, High School Youth Director 1978 - 1983

I consider serving as a Youth Director at Mount Olivet one of the greatest blessings of my life. Perhaps I understood the difference the MO youth programs can make in young people's lives because of the profound difference it made in me as a rather lost young person. In my time there, the staff grew from one to five. Our days were filled with preparing for the programs offered to youth: Hi-League on Sunday nights, which was attended by more than 100 youth; Lock-Ins, retreats, teaching confirmation and outreach. It was incredible to watch youth and adults making a difference in the lives of others. Forty youth boarded a bus every Monday and went to Rolling Acres to work with residents. The seniors were part of a group we called "Outreach" who led devotions, did skits for Hi-league on important topics and called on new 9th graders, inviting them to attend programs. Perhaps the reason this was the most gratifying position I ever held was that I was able to witness first hand the love of God working through others to change the lives of young people in profound ways.


Geoff Arenson, Director of Youth Ministry


