Listen!

We live in a noisy world! Traffic, construction, the constant hum of electrical appliances at home and work, television, or music constantly on in the background. Yes, we live in a noisy world!

Most of us are well aware of the dangers of loud sounds to our hearing – working for long periods with power tools or listening to music at high decibel levels for sustained periods. In recent years, researchers have warned that we're less aware of the damage that constant background noise can do to us. As it turns out, our brains need quiet to process information and, more importantly, to reset and recharge. Absent periods of quiet, we have an increased difficulty deciphering all the noise we hear so that we can understand what it even means. More significantly, absent periods of quiet, our brains get overloaded and dulled and we have difficulty finding meaning and hope at all.

And then there's the cultural noise. Every day, it seems, there are more digital channels coming online, more outlets offering entertainment or information, each, and all of them clamoring for our allegiance. In recent years, this relentless competition for digital market share has led to a "culture of the outrageous," where people – entertainers, politicians, marketers, social media influencers, commentators, and pundits – will do anything, say anything in the relentless pursuit of our attention.

It's in just this kind of congested, super-saturated environment of endless noise and a cacophony of competing voices that we – as individuals, families, and a congregation – are seeking this Lent to slow down, breathe, make space for quiet, and... listen. Listen to ourselves. Listen to each other. And listen to God.

Just before embarking on the long road to Jerusalem and the cross, Jesus took his three closest friends up to the top of a nearby mountain. Once there, Peter, James, and John witnessed Jesus revealed in his glory. As Mark writes, "he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them" (9:2-3). And then Moses and Elijah, representing the law and the prophets at the center of Jewish history, appear on the mountain to speak with Jesus. The disciples are terrified, totally unsure what to do. All of a sudden a cloud overshadows everything

and a voice from heaven rings out, telling them just what to do: "This is my son, the beloved. Listen to him!"

That's it. "Listen to him." Not "fight for him," or "pledge your heart to him," or "dismiss those who don't follow him," but simply, "listen to him." Why? Because in the life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God speaks to us as clearly as possible about just how much God loves us and wants us to love each other. Listen to him. So easy. And yet, as we know too well, so hard when there is so much noise in our lives and so many voices crying out to us.

This Lent, we will have a number of opportunities to practice listening. Listening for God's presence in our lives and listening to God's call to care for ourselves, each other, and God's world. On Sundays, we will listen to a variety of encounters Jesus has with all kinds of people to better understand what God is saying to us through Jesus' ministry. In our daily devotions, we can slow down and listen to the story Mark tells of the last days and hours of Jesus' life and hear again just how much God loves us. On Wednesdays, we will focus on some of the classic "spiritual practices" that have helped Christians over the centuries listen to God: prayer, Bible study, reflection, service, and worship. And through our digital Lenten calendar, we will offer daily opportunities to sharpen our listening skills by putting these ancient spiritual practices to work in our everyday lives. All so that we can detect with more confidence God's presence in our lives, hear God's word of love, be encouraged in faith and life, and share God's love with others in word and deed.

Listen to him. So simple. So important. At times so challenging. Yet, together, so totally do-able! I look forward to sharpening our listening skills throughout this Lenten season so that, come Easter, we can hear once again and anew the life-changing, world-altering good news that God's love and life are more powerful than all things, even death itself.

DEVOTION

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." — Mark 8:34

March is the prime season for a casual fan of college basketball such as me, and part the fun for me is watching the coaches. Coaches tend to leak into the demeanor and actions of their players, and this year I've been attentive to the men's Gopher team under the guidance of new homegrown, hometown, Minnesota alum, first-time, and youngest current head coach in the Big Ten, Ben Johnson. While Coach Johnson and the Gophers have been up against formidable odds and will probably not win a title this year, they've won some great games and I've witnessed wisdom, poise, grit, confidence, and comradery. It's a good sign, and it keeps me tuning in.

These days, we have so many choices in whom we will allow to "coach" us or whom we'll "play for." Those choices have great effect. They affect how we see the world. They affect how we respond to situations and the goals to which we aspire.

Some coaches encourage cheating, falsity, violence, and a win-at-all-costs spirit. Some coaches don't have the knowledge necessary for the level of play needed. Meanwhile, the best coaches know that life is bigger than the game and our individual selves. The best coaches get the most out of players and at the same time teach players to be tough yet kind, determined yet honest, intense yet honorable, skilled yet humble.

It has me thinking about how Jesus "coaches" disciples and how we respond in life, and it spurs the question, whom do you/we follow? Whom do you/we allow to teach and guide? To whom do you/we listen, or believe, or trust? Whom are you "playing for"? Jesus says, "follow me."

God, give us the courage to do so, in our whole life...and go Gophers!

LISTENING AT MOUNT OLIVET

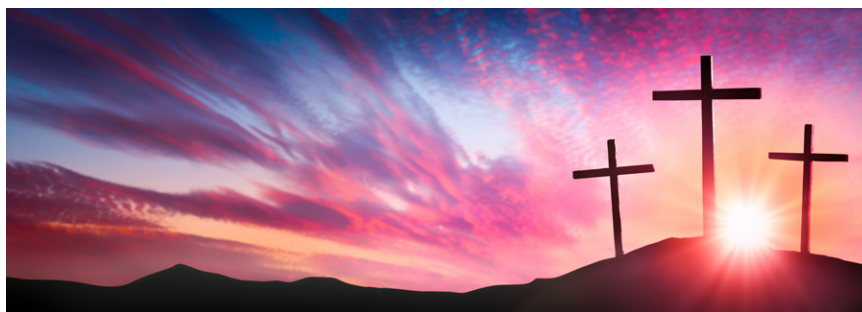

WORD WITH YOUR PASTORS: SO WHAT?!? DOES LUTHER'S THEOLOGY STILL MATTER?

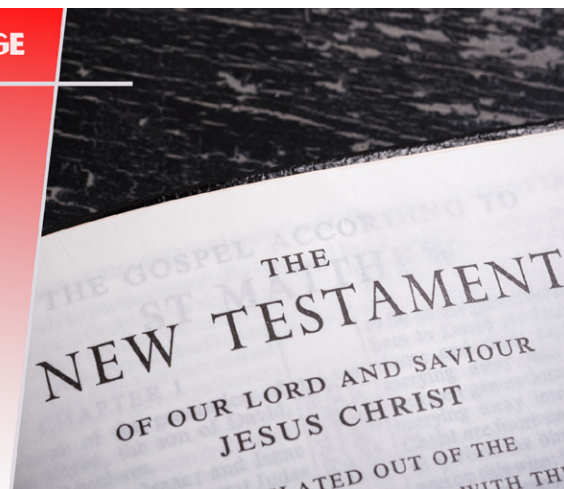
Through his preaching and writing, Martin Luther spurred a reformation of the whole church. His beliefs — that we are justified by grace through faith, that each of us has a calling (vocation), that God uses both government and church to enrich our lives, and that God encourages and directs our lives of faith through law and gospel — shaped the sixteenth century profoundly. But... that was 500 years ago. Does Luther's theology still speak? What relevance do his convictions hold for us today? We'll address these questions by taking a page from Luther's own history. When writing his small and large catechisms, Luther would take central elements of the Christian faith — the Apostles' Creed, Ten Commandments, etc. — and break them down into bite-size pieces and then ask of each one, Was ist Das? Literally "What is this?" Or, more broadly, "What does this mean?" or even "Why does this matter?" So also, we'll lift up four key elements of Luther's theology and ask: "So what? Why does this still matter today?"

Hebrews, James, 1 & 2 Peter, 1 John, 2 John, 3 John, Jude (April Session)

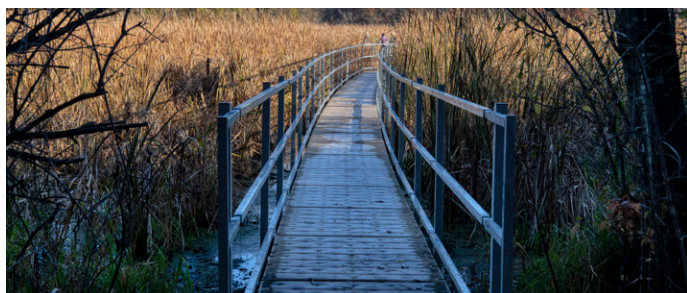
In addition to the 13 letters written by or attributed to Paul, there are eight other letters in the New Testament. They all date from a later period than either the letters of Paul or the Gospels, they are directed more generally to the church at large, and they are trying to contend with challenges that came from the rapid growth and spread of the Christian church. What is the nature of Christian leadership? What do we do with people who believe differently? How do we preserve the tradition when the world and church are changing so quickly? These and other questions addressed make these letters challenging, interesting, and at times instructive as we face similar challenges today.

Why Retreat?

Recently my daughter and I spent a weekend at Mount Olivet Conference & Retreat Center. Half-way through a two-week stint of online schooling, we were desperate for time away in this peaceful, beautiful setting. We hiked through the snow, played games in the renovated library lounge, and swam a lot. At one point, Eleanor requested that we watch Netflix on her iPad. I resisted the temptation to point out that in my childhood this was not remotely possible. Instead, I talked to her about going on “retreat.” As many times as she had romped through the grounds and buildings of the Conference & Retreat Center, I had never really talked about the uniqueness and purpose of retreating.

It’s easy to forget that going away on retreat is not the same as going away on vacation, heading to a spa or wellness resort, or even staying in a hotel for few nights. Retreat is a spiritual practice intended to renew our connections to God, each other, and nature. When we retreat, we slow down. We let our bodies follow their natural rhythms. We listen to each other attentively; we notice the call of songbirds and the wind rustling through the prairie; and we attune ourselves to the buried longings of our own hearts. We contemplate God’s love for us and for all creatures. We are renewed and rejuvenated for daily life. So, it helps to turn off our devices and take off our watches and simply be present to God and each other.

We hope you will consider giving yourself or your family the gift of retreating together. We are waiting to welcome you.
