A Future with Hope

I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. –Jeremiah 29:11

Lately I've been thinking a lot about what a "post-Covid" Mount Olivet may look like. While I realize the pandemic is not completely behind us, we're certainly at a very different point than we were a year ago, let alone two years ago. We've come a long way, been through a lot, and also learned a lot. In light of that, here are three things I believe will guide us as we go forward.

1. No one but God knows exactly what the church will be like going forward. Don't get me wrong: we know a lot of things – about theology, worship, church life, stewardship, outreach, and more – but we don't know what the future holds after two years of greatly disrupted patterns of worship and congregational life and very different ways of engaging with each other. While some may be daunted by this prospect, I believe it is an opportunity for us to grow. When you think you already know the answer, there is very little you are likely to learn. But if we enter this next phase of our ministry with open and curious minds, we can discover new and effective ways to live out our mission.

2. We are at our best and most effective when we build on our strengths. For this reason, in a meeting of program directors and pastors early this summer, we made a list of some of Mount Olivet's historic strengths that will guide our commitments and provide a solid foundation for living into the future. The list... was not short! Here are just a few that quickly come to mind: Relationships are central to our ministry. We are blessed with exceptional worship and music (and the preaching's not bad, either O). We offer responsive and compassionate pastoral care to all ages. We have a tremendous commitment to our youth that is embodied in COP, choirs, and youth groups. We are focused on the Gospel, committed to preaching and teaching the good news in ways that are biblical, connected to our daily life, and non-partisan. We have a heritage of committed and effective outreach to the community, through many ministries at church and through our Affiliated Ministries. We have an incredibly capable and dedicated staff and fantastic facilities. As well as a loyal and generous congregation that entrusts our staff to continue the mission and ministries of Mount Olivet! All of which gives me great confidence that we will find a faithful way forward.

3. Creativity will be key to being the best Mount Olivet we can be today. Building on our historic strengths, harnessing what we've learned these last two years, and eager to learn still more, we are free to try out some new ways of being faithful to our mission. Some of that is happening already, and I'm delighted at some of the "early wins" we've experienced. We're trying to engage the larger community in our life together through events like our December Tree Lighting and Messiah Sing. We're also responding to the needs of our community through our all-day, year-round preschool; our new summer day camps; and focused donation drives and community meals. And we re-imagined our Mount Olivet Gala, attracting double the number of people and raising more funds for our Affiliates. Each of these endeavors was "just an idea" a year ago, and each has moved us forward in our ministry during this new era.

These three convictions about how to move into the future aren't so much answers as they are commitments and pathways to finding a faithful way forward. While there will certainly be new challenges ahead, we are confident the future is in God's good hands and trust the promise that God will give us a future with hope. For this reason, the prayer with which we have closed worship these last two years continues to sum up our confidence that the Holy Spirit continues to be at work in us and through us, always for the good of God's Church and the benefit of God's world. I will close with those words, and invite you to pray it regularly: *Lord God*, *you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

SOLAR UPDATE

A 20 KW solar system of panels was installed on the roof of Mount Olivet's Minneapolis Campus and started producing power in March of 2018. Eight months later, a similarly sized system went online at the West Campus. Ideal Energies installed the systems guided by CEO and Mount Olivet member Chris Psihos. At both campuses there are a total of 110 panels.

A recent review of the solar panels shows that the systems are operating within 4% of their estimated nameplate capacity, totaling more than 125 MWh to date. This power has eliminated more than 87 metric tons of CO2 out of the atmosphere based on typical emissions levels for the U.S. This is equivalent to the amount of CO2 absorbed by planting 1,450 trees.

Over their 25 year lifespans, the energy generated is estimated to avoid more than 672 metric tons of CO2 which is comparable to not burning over 367 tons of coal or 75,000+ gallons of gasoline.

The systems are net metered so when the panels are generating more electricity than the buildings are using, the electricity is sold back to the utility and goes on to the grid. When the church buildings use more electricity than the panels are producing, the utility provides electricity generated from a mix of sources (including coal, natural gas, nuclear and renewables).

The panels generate direct current electricity and are connected in series. Centralized inverters convert the power to alternating current for use. Panels are paired with optimizers to maximize production and allow monitoring of each panel in real time.

As roofs are replaced, the Creation Care Team will assess opportunities for additional solar capacity.

These installations are one of the ways Mount Olivet strives to care for God's creation.

DEVOTION

Come to me, all you that are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. - Matthew 11:28

A long, long time ago, two of my besties and I used to run marathons and bike distances. We'd pick a good cause to raise money for (and to spur us on) the Leukemia Society or the Lung Association-or something just for fun-the Rock n Roll Marathon- sign up and get training. We never took it too seriously, though. We all had little kids at home, and time and sleep were at a



premium. Sometimes I think we did it just because it was a sacred, set-in-stone time alone every Saturday morning from 8-12. Pure luxury when you're balancing work and changing diapers and the age when they ask "Why Mommy? What's that? What doing, Mommy? Why?" 100 or so times a day.

Just us moms. We'd head out the door, leave our responsibilities behind, and just run. We would vent our joys and frustrations, share our life experiences with one another, seeking advice and encouragement– lifting us up and buoying us on in running, and in life.

The marathons were fun. Well, finishing them was fun, anyway. We loved running along with the beautiful autumn leaves and breezes in Minneapolis, seeing the amazing crowds cheering us on in Duluth, listening to the bagpiper on the notorious Lemon Drop Hill, and peddling through the Illinois countryside. Having no water until Mile 10 in San Diego on a blisteringly hot day? Not so much.

There comes a point in every marathon, at least for us back-of-the-packers, where you just want to stop. To sit down and rest. I remember one year sitting in a Porta Potty on Summit Avenue around mile 20 or so, my friend pounding on the door and yelling, "You're not even peeing are you?! You're just resting! Get out here and finish the race!!"

Busted.

That's how I felt yesterday. Confused, frustrated, exhausted. I had hit the proverbial running 'wall'. I crawled into bed at 11:58 and opened the *Jesus Calling* devotion by Sarah Young:

"REST IN ME MY CHILD. Give your mind a break from planning and trying to anticipate what will happen. Pray continually, asking my Spirit to take charge of the details of this day. Remember that you are on a journey with Me. When you try to peer into the future, and plan for every possibility, you ignore your Constant Companion, who sustains you moment by moment. As you gaze anxiously into the distance, you don't even feel the strong grip of My hand holding yours. How foolish you are my child! Remembrance of Me is a daily discipline. Tending To Trauma: Yours, Mine, And Ours

Monday, August 8, through Tuesday, August 9

"The opposite of trauma is connection," says therapist and sociologist Terry Real. Traumatizing experiences leave us feeling isolated and lonely. In this retreat, therapist and professor Carla Dahl will lead us in exploring how to relate to our personal trauma histories,



how to recognize and tend to the evidence of traumatic experiences in others, and how to deepen our awareness of collective trauma (including intergenerational trauma and community experiences of disaster). We will discuss physiological and spiritual aspects of trauma, the importance of self-compassion, and practices and rituals that help re-establish connection with ourselves and others. Whether you are personally experiencing trauma or caring for others with traumatic experiences, (or both), this retreat will increase your capacity to live with hope and healing in the midst of it all.

Carla Dahl is Professor Emerita of Congregational and Community Care at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. She has trained therapists and clergy since 1993 and also has a private counseling and consulting practice, working with individuals, couples, and groups around issues of grief, spirituality, relationships, and life transitions. She's written in the areas of ambiguous loss, families and spirituality, and the training of helping professionals; her current research focus is on long-distance grandmothering, and her research assistant, 6-year-old Guthrie, lives in northeastern Wisconsin.

GETTING TO KNOW THE BIBLE can sometimes feel like a difficult chore, but I'd argue that it doesn't have to be. Even learning and calling to mind a few brief stories and teachings of Jesus or having some sense of who wrote the scripture and what the faithful hoped to pass along can bring instant aid and assurance, direction and perspective, and even fun and humor to situations.

For instance, these past years and months I've carried closely Jesus' words about children: "The kingdom of God belongs to such as these" (Mark 10:13-16). I'm struck by how this sentence has directed my attention in the world and my work. I find I'm reminded to listen closely to what kids say and encounter. Or when confronting challenges in the world, I'm reminded to be attentive to kids. Also I remember in my baptism I'm named a "child of God." Apparently, the kingdom belongs to me as well!

At Cathedral of the Pines, a daily chapel song quotes a story in the gospel of Mark: "I believe; help my unbelief" (9:24). What a gift! I recall it's okay to be honest about my doubts and continued questions. Following Jesus doesn't mean I need to have an answer to everything.

Bible stories can bring joy. One of my favorites is the ridiculous promise Abraham and Sarah receive in the book of Genesis, when despite being childless and well past the normal years of fertility, God promises a kid. Hearing it, both Abraham and Sarah laugh so hard they fall on their faces! Have you ever laughed that hard? I have. Have you ever laughed that hard in wild cynicism toward God? I've done that, too! And here's the delight, when God's promise comes to fruition Abraham and Sarah in humble humor name their child *Isaac*, which in Hebrew means "laughter."

All this to say, I encourage you to keep reading and listening and studying the stories of scripture. Take it easy. Make it fun. Maybe put a story or verse on your mirror where you brush your teeth or by the door to the cabin, or next to where you keep your shoes. "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105). Maybe just focus on a few little sayings or stories which are meaningful to you. **GET TO KNOW THEM WELL AND SEE HOW THEY DIRECT YOUR ATTENTION IN THE WORLD AND YOUR FAITH IN CHRIST.**

And as always, take advantage of the educational offerings we seek to provide through Mount Olivet. From the Gospel Unplugged, to upcoming Bible studies, to sermons, to devotions, it's all offered in an attempt to help us all grow in faith. And if you ever get stumped, no worries. 7TH & 8TH GRADE CONFIRMATION

Confirmation occurs during the 7th and 8th grade years in school. The Confirmation program helps 7th and 8th graders learn more about the Bible and their faith while forming important relationships with their peers, pastors, youth staff, and small group leaders. Along the way, students not only learn about
