Angels Then and Now

Some years ago, a Washington Post reporter watched as a street musician played his violin in one of the city subway stations. The violinist played for an hour, and while more than 1000 commuters passed by him, none stopped to listen to the music. Perhaps that's not surprising, as commuters are often in a hurry and street musicians are not uncommon at subway stops. But this was no ordinary street musician. It was Joshua Bell, famed concert violinist, repeating a program he'd given at the Boston Philharmonic a week earlier in a sold-out concert where the "cheap seats" went for \$100. More than a thousand people passed by... and none stopped to listen.

It's hard to imagine hearing one of the world's great violinists and not even noticing. Or is it? How many other things of wonder and delight do we miss because we're too busy, or don't expect to be amazed, or just aren't paying attention. According to the Bible, one of the things of wonder and delight we may miss is angels. Perhaps that's because we think of angels as having wings and playing harps, per a cultural imagination shaped more by Hallmark than Scripture. According to the biblical writers, however, angels make themselves known less by their appearance than by what they do: serve as messengers from God. For this reason, we should always be alert to the possibility that angels are all around us. As the author of the Letter to the Hebrews urges, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (Hebrew 13:1-2).

This Advent, we are exploring biblical stories that help us detect angels in our midst and prepare us to serve as God's messengers for others. In the Advent devotions, we look at 21 stories that record the presence of angels, noting that they variously offer words of comfort, warning, or good news, always for the sake of encouraging God's children. On Sundays, we read four stories within the Christmas narratives of the Gospels of Luke and Matthew in order to be more likely to recognize, and serve as, God's messengers.

The story Luke shares is probably the more familiar of the two, featuring the angel Gabriel as he announces first to Zechariah and then to Mary the miraculous birth of children: John the Baptist to old Zechariah and his wife Elizabeth, and Jesus to young Mary. An angel also appears later in the story, announcing the good news

of Christ's birth to the lowly shepherds and urging them to attend the child and is then joined by a company of angels. One element of Luke's story that seems especially important during days marked by cultural divisions at home and wars abroad is the heart of the angelic song: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those God favors." The tight grammatical construction suggests that these are not two independent statements but that they are causally linked, even inter-related. That is, God shows God's glory by offering peace to God's children. Or even, we glorify God to the degree that we manifest and work for peace among all. The angels in Luke's Christmas story invite us not only to long for peace but also to work for peace because we know this is what God desires for all people.

Matthew's briefer story offers additional insight. In his account, an angel appears to Joseph and encourages him to take pregnant Mary as his wife. Interestingly, the angel is not named. And when a significant character goes unnamed in a biblical story, the author is often inviting those listening to the story an opportunity to identify with that character. In this case, we might wonder how we might offer words of comfort and courage to those around us and in this way serve as God's messenger.

The coming weeks are among my favorite of the year, filled with all the preparations we make to celebrate Christmas at church and with our families and friends. Among the blessed busy-ness of the season, I hope you take time to slow down and make room to notice angels and, even to serve as one to others. It's easier than you think: you just have to look for those bringing God's word of peace and goodwill and, when you have an opportunity, to share that message with others in word and deed.



2022: A Year of Renewed Hospitality

Mount Olivet Conference & Retreat Center is a ministry of hospitality. We join God's wide welcome of all—a welcome that nurtures guests' wellbeing through inspiring programs, beautiful land, nourishing food, and comforting accommodations and amenities. Just as God receives us into a space not our own, i.e., into relationship with God, so we welcome and receive guests with openness, warmth, and care. This past year we welcomed over 280 groups and 5,600 guests. Over 100 of these groups and personal retreats visited us for their first time. And some were quite unique, for example, 70 martial arts instructors, 45 women tree climbers, 80 college-aged mission workers, and 18 people who "Pedal & Roll for Parkinson's." In addition to this, we sponsored a number of events: midweek summer worship services and nature talks; outdoor concerts and stargazing; Nature Camp and Family Days Away in partnership with the Children & Family Ministries team; Day Lenten and Day Advent Journeys; Mother's Day worship and brunch; Women's Weekend; Crafty Ladies Retreat; seasonal volunteer days; and, online workshops. We partnered with others inside and outside the Mount Olivet system in offering a trauma retreat and a grief retreat, both aimed at welcoming people to experience God's healing.

At Mount Olivet Conference & Retreat Center, we often ask the questions: How can this building or this lounge invite people to rest, collaborate, or reconnect with themselves? How do the prairie, woods, and marsh beckon people home to God, to themselves, to their vocations? Our discernment led to updated and remodeled indoor spaces, such as the main lounge, pool area, and hotel-style rooms in the Ruth Cornell House. Outside we added a natural playscape, a Gagaball pit, and a new retaining wall and wildflower garden. Relaxing near our 20+ wildflower gardens, guests are invited to trust God's care for them. As Jesus said, "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? Therefore, do not worry."


WOMEN'S WEEKEND: RESTING AS RESISTANCE


Friday, January 27 through Sunday, January 29, Conference & Retreat Center
